## **Objectives**

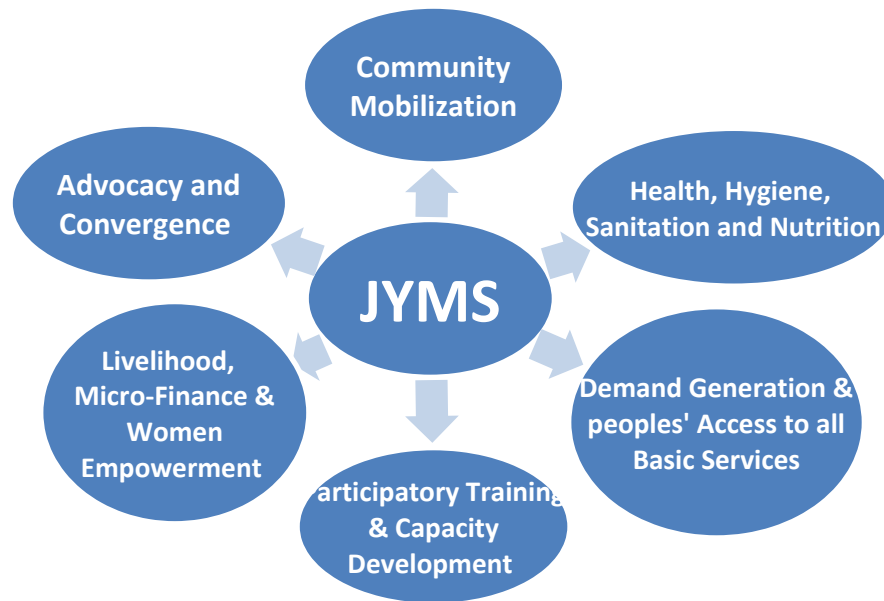

- Capacity building of women to ensure their equal participation in decision making process at different levels in the government and mainstreaming their gender role in the society.
- Making efforts for conservation & promotion of livelihoods resources for people in the rural areas, forest dwellers and tribal community with sustainable use of natural resources.
- Ensuring and promoting rural and poor peoples' access to education and health facilities, particularly to basic health care.
- Creating a conducive environment for encouraging participation of rural poor, deprived, tribal and Dalit and other vulnerable communities and women in decision making process at all levels in local self-governance like in Panchayat.
- Building and operationalizing small scale and cottage industry for increasing livelihood options for women in rural areas of Madhya Pradesh and hence making all round efforts for their self-reliance and empowerment.

### **Our Working Area**

The working area of Jagriti Yuwa Manch Samiti (JYMS) is entire Madhya Pradesh. But its focus of work is more on making intensive efforts for self-reliance and empowerment of people and community in the district of **Panna, Chhatarpur, katni, Satna, Jabalpur, Mandla** that were graded as the most backward districts in the State.

### **JYMS Intervention Areas in Development Sector**



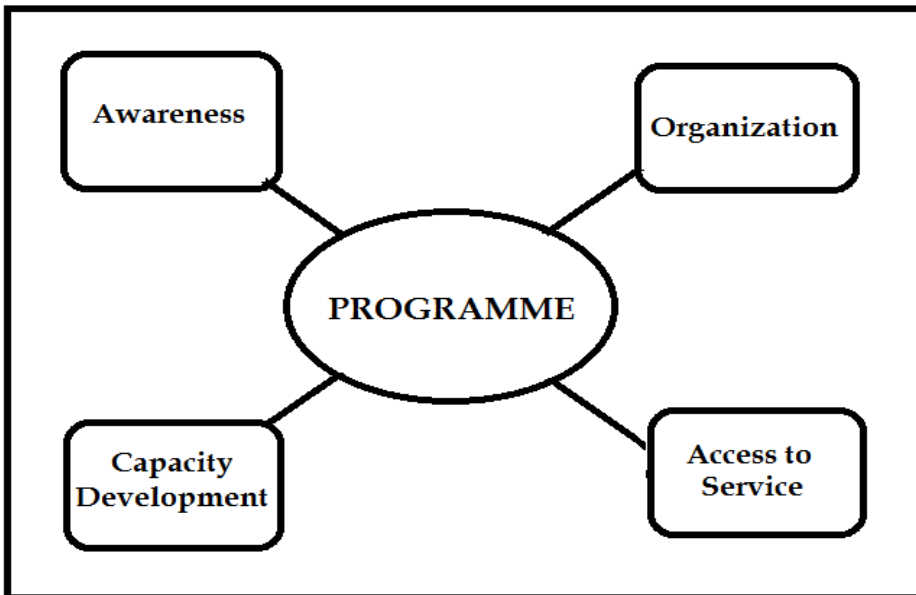
## Strategy and Program of JYMS

### STRATEGY

- ✓ Building community based organization and empowering women
- ✓ Generating awareness on education and health issues as well as conserving & promoting folk culture
- ✓ Conservation and promotion of water-forest-land and conducting environmental activities like on promotion of rainwater harvesting structures, plantation etc.
- ✓ Establishing and promoting linkages and coordination of people with the government at different levels
- ✓ Providing education and training on protecting our democratic values and principles as enshrined in the fundamental rights of our constitution
- ✓ Conducting Advocacy, documentation, research and study on resolving issues and problems that are faced by poor, deprived and other vulnerable communities, especially women of the region.

### PROGRAM

Under major interventions JYMS has four major programs to achieve its goal. All these programs are linked to awareness generation, organization building, and capacity development and thus ensuring people's access to all basic services at village level.



## Major Achievements of JYMS

### WOMEN EMPOWERMENT

JYMS attempts to mobilize women for developing their capacity by forming groups of women, providing financial assistance by linking women's groups with banks and in a way contributes in the social, economic empowerment of women. In this concern different activities are conducted on regular basis at village level on issues of gender justice and development of the villages like organizing fortnightly and monthly meetings with women. In addition, JYMS makes efforts for political empowerment of women. For which women representation in Panchayat is encouraged by establishing linkages of one women group to another at village, cluster and block levels. JYMS makes a new story of women empowerment. This work is going on in Shahnagar and Gunnor tehsil of Panna district. Madhya Pradesh Women Finance and Development Corporation is financing this program.

**Following are some major achievements of this initiative:**

- ✓ Women empowerment program is being run in 123 villages of two tehsil namely Shahnagar and Gunnor under Panna district with 52 and 42 Gram Panchayats respectively and with participation of 8566 women from different social and economic background.

- ✓ Coordination centre was first established in Shahnagar and second in Raipur under Shahnagar tehsil and third one was established in Gunnor.
- ✓ There are total of 8489 women members in 610 women Self-Help Groups (SHGs).
- ✓ The total saving of 610 SHGs is Rs. 65, 73,517 (Rupees Sixty five lakhs seventy three thousands five hundred and seventeen) and these groups saved upto Rs. 11, 57,323 (Rupees Eleven lakhs fifty seven thousands three hundred and twenty three) in this financial year.
- ✓ 609 SHGs out of 610 SHGs have bank account and they were provided Rs. 55, 92,306 (Rupees fifty five lakhs ninety two thousand three hundred and six), which these groups are using in their different economic activities.
- ✓ 420 SHGs out of 610 SHGs belonging to BPL families have been linked with Swarn Jayanti Swa-rojgar Yojna in which these SHGs got subsidies of Rs. 30,48,700 (Rupees Thirty lakh forty eight thousand seven hundred).
- ✓ 147 SHG have been linked to Cash Credit Limit Schemes of the Bank.
- ✓ SHG groups were linked to inter-loaning schemes, where 4708 women were provided loan facility of Rs. 95,57,989 (Rupees Ninety five lakh fifty seven thousand nine hundred eighty nine).
- ✓ 254 SHGs were awarded first and 130 SHGs awarded second grade based on their performance.
- ✓ Women of SHGs were linked to different small scale economic activities on the basis of availability of natural resources to provide them employment and self-sustaining life.
- ✓ 9 women are engaged in making bamboo pots, 6 in bricks production, 12 in earthen pot making and 193 in Agarbatti production. As of now total number of 220 women have become self-reliant and are engaged in construction and production work.
- ✓ 39 Women are engaged in making Ventex Jewellery. These woman that made Ventex Jewelleries were displayed in a state level exhibition.
- ✓ 18 women are engaged in production of readymade garment while one woman is engaged in weaving blanket.
- ✓ Members of SHGs were encouraged to work in shops in villages, where 99 women are engaged in shops of Manihari, 146 women in daily need item shops and 6 in tea stalls and restaurants thus a total of 261 women are engaged in small scale businesses in their respective villages.

- ✓ 1570 women members are engaged in agriculture activities while 116 are engaged in the vegetable production.
- ✓ 221 women are engaged in livestock like in goat rearing and 28 in milk production thus a total of 249 women are working and they are now economically self-reliant.
- ✓ 108 women are engaged in collection and marketing of small forest produce like *char chirounji* (a minor forest produce), *tendu* leaves and *bassia latifolia* at local level.
- ✓ Thus a total of 2581 women contribute in their families' expenses with their engagement in different small scale entrepreneurship.

### **Formation of Federation of women groups**

Federation of women groups were formed under Madhya Pradesh Cooperative Society Act of 1960 to push forward women groups of Panna district in the production and marketing field. The name of this federation is "JAGRITI MAHILA SAKHA SAHAKARI SAMITI MARYADIT, SHAHNAGAR (AWAKE WOMEN CREDIT COOPERATIVE COMMITTEE MARYADIT, SHAHNAGAR) and its registration number is ARP 732, dated 22 September 2012. There are 11 Executive Board Members and 36 members in the Federation.

### **Access to Government Schemes through Awareness Generation**

Capacity building of people from underprivileged communities to access to different government schemes and ensuring their rights through awareness generation under organization building and capacity development program. **As a result, the progress that were made in this field are:**

- ✓ 368 families were provided Below Poverty Line card (i.e. BPL Card) after their identification. Similarly, 405 families were allotted the cards under Deen Dayal Antyoday Anna Scheme.
- ✓ 134 women have benefited from Widow Pension Scheme and 167 men and women from Old Age Pension Scheme.
- ✓ Girls from 95 families benefitted from Ladali Lakshmi Scheme.
- ✓ 29 families were benefitted under Indira Awas Yojana (Indira housing scheme).
- ✓ 107 landless labourers were benefitted from Mukhya Mantri Mazdoor Suraksha Yojana (Chief Minister Labourer Security Scheme).
- ✓ 31 families were provided benefit under National Family Aid Scheme.
- ✓ 86 farmers were provided benefit by the organisation as they constructed well in their farm and now they are cultivating their irrigated land.

- ✓ 235 women were benefitted from Janani Suraksha Yojana at the time of delivery of their pregnancy.
- ✓ 58 girls married under Mukhya Mantri Kanyadan Yojana.
- ✓ 25 marginal farmers got benefit from Agriculture Village Demonstration scheme of agriculture department.
- ✓ 4 marginal farmers were provided assistance in the plantation of their fruit trees from horticulture department.
- ✓ 40 women were encouraged to adopt family planning.

### **Awareness on Tuberculosis Disease**

Some population of Panna district work in stone mining; as a result, they have always fear of being infected from tuberculosis as some mining laborers have already been affected from this disease. In such situation, JYMS is generating awareness among people living in the stone quarry villages by conducting regular meeting with them. People infected from tuberculosis were identified and were provided free health checkup facility and information on the health related government schemes with the help of Voluntary Health Association of Madhya Pradesh. 980 men and women from 48 villages participated in these meetings that were provided under this program.

### **Safe Drinking Water, Sanitation and Hygiene**

These three components are very crucial for any healthy society to grow, but people are not sensitive about using safe drinking water due to lack of awareness. JYMS organized street plays in 25 villages for awareness generation among people and mobilizing them to construct toilets, to start hygiene practices and widely disseminated information on National Drinking Water, Pipe Water Supply Scheme under Maryada Abhiyan that was campaigned at district level. As a result, more than 2000 families were encouraged to construct new toilets in their homes and about 15000 families submitted demand for the construction of this facility within 6 month from the start of our program. Peoples were made aware with our dissemination drive on disadvantages of open defecation and washing hands before eating and after using toilet. We also encouraged around 32000 people to follow best hygiene practices.

### **Energy Conservation**

The issue of energy supply is becoming more and more challenging with the increase in consumption and demands of energy with the increasing population growth. It is necessary to make people aware of the traditional and alternate sources of energy to balance between consumption demand and supply of energy and reducing the consumption of



energy. In this concern, JYMS focuses on generating awareness on conservation of energy and use of CFL.

## **Girls Education**

Girl plays an important role in the society. As a girl and woman she look after her entire family and does household chores. When boy is educated, only he is benefitted but when girl is educated the entire family is benefitted. As such girls are backbone of the family and society. JYMS recognized this fact very early. So the organization conducts regular meetings with the guardians of school children in Raisatan, Gidoudha and Mankoura to make them realize of the importance of girl education.

## **Water Conservation**

Among the main reasons for depleting ground water resources are over exploitation of ground water and lack of awareness of sustainable use of water and water conservation i.e. rainwater harvesting. In this concern discussions were held on different ways of harvesting rainwater like farm bunding, earthen dam, cantor dam and stop dam. A small earthen dam constructed with 50 packet of sands in Gidoudha village. Rainwater harvested in this earthen dam increased the availability of water and ensured sufficient water for drinking of cattle and irrigation purposes.

## **Environmental Awareness**

Deforestation and emission of greenhouse gases and pollutants from the industry are the main cause of climate change, increase in sea level and other related challenges faced by human being. Because of this, many other challenges of environment and livelihood are being posed on people like natural disasters and calamity like flood, drought, etc., food insecurity. In view of all that JYMS organized awareness rally, poster competition, exhibition and conducted tree plantation activities from time to time for generating awareness on environment. Villagers planted 7256 trees in 90 villages after the awareness generation program by the organization. Some efforts were also made on “Plastic Free Village” in Salaiyaforan village by drawing villagers’ attention on disadvantages of using plastic bags.

## **Livestock Management**

Animal husbandry is the backbone of rural livelihood. Identification of diseases and prevention of diseases in animals and vaccination of animals/ livestock for prevention is very crucial for the management of the livestock in the villages. Focusing on this issue, JYMS develop understanding with the villagers on the importance of livestock management, vaccination of animals and different government schemes on that. In this concern, 20 animals were vaccinated in Salaiyaforan village.

## **De-addiction**

Drug addiction has emerged as another major challenge in our society with more and more youths are preyed to this trend. Drug addiction can start with experimental use of a recreational drug in social situation but it becomes frequent with passing time and gradually body start weakening but addicted person may need larger doses of drugs and as a result his/her body becomes nonfunctional and he/she dies before he/she could understand the bad effects and disadvantages of using intoxicants. JYMS started a journey to make a society free from intoxication and organized several street plays and theatre for wider awareness generation on this issue. As a result, 660 peoples from 42 villages resolved to give up all such bad habits and now they are leading a drug free life.

## **Organic Farming**

Increasing use of chemical fertilizer and pesticide in agriculture is very dangerous trend as it contaminate food-grains, vegetables, fruits and milk that are the basic food need for the sustenance of human beings. As a result, human life is reaching to the very dangerous situation. Indiscriminate use of chemical fertilizers for growing crop has become threat to human life. Not only that, this is also converting fertile land into barren land. Only there is one option to tackle this situation and that is organic farming. It has been proved that vermin compost is helpful in increasing the productivity of grains. It does not pollute water, land and air and in this vermin compost farming water is required less as compared to using chemical fertilizer or pesticide and also it is cheaper and is cost effective than chemical fertilizer. Taking all these objectives into account JYMS motivated farmers for organic farming in Madhavpura, Josinha, Bulbula and Bhajia village with awareness generation.

## **Mainstreaming Gender and Gender Equality**

Discrimination against women start from a family to society and they are discriminated even when she as a baby is in the mother's womb as there is common practice of illegally using medical method for sex determination in the pregnant woman. In this patriarchal situation women's opportunity and freedom, which are prerequisite for any human being to develop and grow, are curtailed. Regular discussion are held on this issue in villages to change the discriminatory approach and attitude against women. In this social reality JYMS generate awareness among villagers about the disadvantages of gender inequality in the society.

## **Right to Forest Land**

250 tribal families from 71 villages were granted right to forest land which were under their ancestral possession and 61 tribal families were granted right to homestead land in the forest villages after a successful intervention of JYMS in its drive for fair implementation of Forest Rights Recognition Act, 2006.

## **Employment Guarantee Act**

JYMS generated awareness on Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (MNREGA) by organizing street plays, songs, film shows in 213 villages of 102 Panchayats of Shahanagar block and after organization's intervention and facilitation over 202 families were provided job cards.

## **Strengthening Community Based organization**

Regular meeting on community and village development are organized in community based organizations, which were formed earlier in 123 villages that generate awareness on different social issues.

## **Awareness on HIV AIDS**

Increasing the number of HIV/AIDS patient in the state is a subject of big concern. JYMS has started the work on Link Worker Scheme in Panna and Targeted Intervention Project in Satna with the help of Madhya Pradesh State Aids Control Committee to combat this critical situation.

## **Link worker scheme**

Link Worker Scheme was initiated to prevent AIDS by developing community based model in susceptible areas for AIDS in 100 villages of 90 panchayats under Shahnagar, Pawai, Ajaynagar, Panna and Gunnor block in Panna district. Activities like distribution and ensuring the availability of condoms among high-risk groups, other men and women, identification of AIDS patients, consultancy with the government for different services like for the treatment of sexual and tuberculosis diseases and reducing the discriminatory practices of people against AIDS victims by sensitizing and mobilizing community which are included in this project.

## **Targeted Intervention Project**

Satna is included in the district of high risk zone of HIV/AIDS in the state of Madhya Pradesh. This project was started to prevent the spread of HIV and STI among female sex workers, male-to-male sex workers and those injecting and using drugs. In this concern some activities like STI treatment to targeted population, providing consultancy services, distribution of condoms among core groups, promoting safe delivery of injection, capacity development of core group members and contacting with aid services which are included in this project.

## **Human Resource Management by JYMS**

Human resource development policy of JYMS focuses on holistic development approach on manpower. JYMS gives value to groups' satisfaction, ensures quality of program and

management, promotes innovative ideas, and ensures effective implementation and monitoring of the program.

Selection, appointment, training for capacity development of staff members, evaluation and management, progress and transfer and keeping individual record of workers, salaries, honorarium and other allowances and assessment of their performances are included in our HR policy.
